

Quarterly Report to 30 June 2025

- Muchea West Silica Sand Project mining lease granted following extended period of engagement with key project stakeholders, including DEMIRS and the Department of Defence.
- Access agreements secured at Down South Silica Sand Project, paving the way for on-ground exploration activities to commence.
- Successful rights issue and shortfall placement secures up to \$1.78 million in funding, supported by significant commitments from directors.

Carbine Resources Limited (ASX: CRB) (Carbine, the **Company**) is pleased to provide the following update on its operations over the guarter ended 30 June 2025.

Muchea West Silica Sand Project



Project Overview

The Muchea West Project is located approximately 40km north-northeast of Perth and approximately 500m to the west of Muchea (Figure 1). Covering a land area of 102km², the Project consists of a granted exploration licence, E70/4905, and a Mining Licence Application, MLA70/1422 (Figure 2). There is excellent access with the nearby Tonkin Highway and the Moora-Kwinana Railway providing a direct connection with the Kwinana Bulk Terminal, key for bulk transport projects.

The Muchea West Project currently hosts a resource of 110Mt at 99.65% SiO_2^1 and an Exploration Target of 762 Mt to 938 Mt of Silica Sand at an average grade of 99.6% to 99.8% SiO_2^2 .

The high silica (SiO_2) grade and the low levels of impurities of the raw, in situ, deposit places Carbine at the forefront of existing Australian silica sand projects.

Preliminary process testwork has demonstrated that a simple process of wet attritioning alone can reduce the Muchea West Fe_2O_3 content by 65% with similar reductions in the other deleterious elements for the Muchea West silica sand.

Project Activities

During the quarter, Carbine continued to engage with key stakeholders in relation to the Muchea West Silica Sand Project, including the Department of Energy, Mines, Industry Regulation and Safety (DEMIRS), the Department of Defence and the operator of the DBNGP (AGIG) (refer to ASX release of 9 May 2025 for further details).




Figure 3: Distribution of Muchea West Project Silica Sand Resources

On 14 May 2025, the Company announced it had been granted a mining lease at the Muchea West Silica Sand Project by DEMIRS. The area of the newly granted mining lease (M70/1433) is shown in Figure 2, which covers a portion of the current Muchea West Silica Sand Project resource of 110Mt at 99.65% SiO₂³ (refer Figure 3). The balance of the Muchea West Silica Sand Project resources are located on granted exploration licence E70/4905 (refer Figures 2 & 3). M70/1433 has been granted for an initial term of 21 years.

While the grant of the Muchea West Silica Sand Project mining lease is considered a significant milestone for the Company, the mining lease does not allow for commencement of mining activities at the project, which remains subject to statutory approvals and consents, including environmental approvals and consents relating to the Muchea Air Weapons Range. The Company has been working closely with key project stakeholders, including DEMIRS and the Department of Defence, for a considerable period to progress towards securing a mining lease and will look to build on these relationships through the next approvals phase.

Down South Silica Sand Project

Project Overview

The Down South Silica Sand Project covers a land area of 5,800Ha (58km²) consisting of three granted exploration licences, E70/5823, E70/6414 and E70/6415. The Project is located approximately 10km southeast of Bunbury in the Wellington Land Division of the Southwest Mineral Field and within the shires of Capel (5,093Ha) and Dardanup (703Ha). The area can be located on the Collie (SI50 – 06) 1:250,000 map sheet and the Bunbury (2031) 1:100,000 map sheet. The ground has been the subject of numerous drilling programs, predominantly for mineral sands, but at least three companies have explored for silica sands.




Figure 4: Areas of Interest at Down South Silica Sand Project

Work completed by Westralian Sands prior to 1970 identified a number of areas of interest (Areas A, B and C shown in Figure 4) and the culmination of this work led to a small mining operation to test the economics of a silica sand export project from their Area A location. Later, Australian United Silica Corporation Pty Ltd (AUSCO) mapped surface expressions of white sand and produced an outline of areas of potential (1, 2 and 3 shown in Figure 4).

Work completed by Westralian Sands prior to 1970 identified a number of areas of interest (Areas A, B and C shown in Figure 4) and the culmination of this work led to a small mining operation to test the economics of a silica sand export project from their Area A location. Later, Australian United Silica Corporation Pty Ltd (AUSCO) mapped surface expressions of white sand and produced an outline of areas of potential (1, 2 and 3 shown in Figure 4).

Project Activities

During the quarter, Carbine continued to engage with its project consultants ProjX to progress its project planning and strategic activities, including introductions to landowners within E70/5823 and further reconnaissance activities focused on the identified areas of interest for silica sand resources.

On 9 May 2025, the Company announced that access agreements have now been secured with three landowners within sand target area 1 in E70/5823 (refer Figure 4), paving the way for on-ground exploration activities to commence at the Down South Silica Sand Project. During the quarter, additional access agreements were secured, opening up further areas for Carbine's future exploration activities.



Carbine remains in discussions with various other landowners at the Project and is confident additional progress will be made. Carbine will engage an experienced silica sand contract geologist to assist with planning and execution of exploration activities on the available areas, which is expected to include further field reconnaissance and a maiden auger drilling campaign.

Corporate Updates

Capital Raising

On 21 May 2025, Carbine announced that it was undertaking a pro-rata non-renounceable entitlement offer on the basis of two (2) new shares for every three (3) shares held by eligible shareholders at a price of \$0.003 per share. Refer to the Company's ASX release and prospectus dated 21 May 2025 for further details.

On 18 June 2025, Carbine announced the results of the entitlement offer and shortfall placement, raising a total of up to \$1,780,384 (before costs) as follows:

448,425,278 shares were issued on 18 June 2025 pursuant to accepted entitlements and the placement of shortfall under the entitlement offer to raise \$1,345,275 (before costs). A further 145,036,000 shares will be issued to sophisticated and professional investors and related parties of the Company, subject to shareholder approval, to raise an additional \$435,000 (before costs). A general meeting of shareholders has been convened on Friday, 8 August 2025 for these purposes (refer to the Company's ASX releases of 4 July 2025 for further details).

The mineral resource estimate in this announcement was reported by the Company in accordance with listing rule 5.8 on 30 October 2023. The information in this report that relates to technical assessment of the Exploration Target for the Muchea West Silica Sand Project is based on, and fairly represents, information and supporting documentation prepared by Mr Lynn Widenbar BSc(Hons), MSc, DIC, a Competent Person who is a member of the Australasian Institute of Mining and Metallurgy and the Australian Institute of Geoscientists. Mr Widenbar is an employee of Widenbar and Associates Pty Ltd. Mr Widenbar has sufficient experience that is relevant to the technical assessment of the mineral assets under consideration, the style of mineralisation and type of deposit under consideration and to the activity being undertaken to qualify as a Competent Person as defined



in the 2012 Edition of the Joint Ore Reserves Committee Australasian Code for Reporting of Exploration Results, Mineral Resources and Ore Reserves. The Exploration Target was first reported by the Company on 29 July 2021 and subsequently revised on 4 July 2022 with the estimation of the maiden resource at Muchea West. There has been no change to the Exploration Target with the updated resource estimation on 30 October 2023.

Mr Widenbar consents to the inclusion of the matters based on his information in the form and context in which it appears in this Presentation and has not withdrawn his consent before lodgement of this report.
